One	Lesson 1: Write down everything 'bad' you have thought, said and done in your life on a blank piece of paper. Allow children 10 minutes to complete their list. Who would like to share their list? Why don't you want to share? List thoughts on the whiteboard of why students don't want to share? Talk about how you would feel if this list was made into a news story for the whole world to see. Using the paper shredder, students shred their list. Discuss how Jesus was the ultimate sacrifice and took away our sin and his forgiveness. Read the story about 'God's filing Cabinet'. Lesson 2: Divide students into small groups and give them each a small drama scenario to act out, eg.
