

## Graduate Certificate in Education and Theology (GCET) Course Structure Proposal

A University of Divinity (UD) graduate certificate is 72 points (the equivalent of one full time semester)

It is suggested that the totality of this award be considered in 12 point blocks. Each 12 points is roughly the equivalent of 100 hours and 3,000-3,500 words of assessment. (A standard UD post graduate unit is 24 points, half units are suggested to enable more choice and to make the study load more manageable. People can undertake more than one in a single semester if they wish)

### Route 1 (for non CS teachers, ALC preservice graduates and chaplains who don't teach CS)
