Dr Katherine Thompson

Spiritual Discipline and Wellbeing

Discuss the place of spiritual discipline, including Christ-Centred Mindfulness in supporting wellbeing. *Dr Katherine Thompson is a Mental Health Social Worker, Clinical Researcher and Academic. She works in private practice providing mental health treatment to young people aged 12-25 years, and supports mission organisations and their staff. She has researched mental disorders in young people for more than 20 years. She is Head of Teaching for the Centre of Theology and Psychology at Melbourne School of Theology. She is author of Christ-Centred Mindfulness and Christ-Centred Mindfulness for Young People.*

How Young People Develop their Engagement in Faith: Unpacking the Mechanics of Spirituality, Religion and Belief

What are the mechanisms by which young people develop their engagement in faith? And how can a school positively and constructively influence these processes? In this session, we will look at the insights that religious psychology offer to these questions.

Dr Rowan Lewis (BCom (Hons), MCS, PhD) Over the last 15 years Rowan has created and led formation programs for youth and young adults as well as specialised in accompanying young people amidst times of doubt and spiritual transition. His PhD research focused on the dynamics of a faith crisis. He currently serves as the Academic Coordinator for Pastoral Theology at ACOM (Australian College of Ministry). Together with his wife Kirra, Rowan lives in Melbourne with three energetic teenagers who keep life suitably animated.

All education is transformational and faith-based education seeks to engage in this endeavour in a particular way. Integral to our effectiveness in this space is how we understand what we are trying to do in the task of formation.

Professor Br David Hall FMS has been a principal of several Catholic schools; primary and secondary, co-educational and single-sex. Br David is involved in the governance of independent Catholic schools as a member of boards and councils and also conducts workshops and other professional learning activities in the areas of spiritual formation and leadership. He is leading an extensive professional development program for Catholic school leaders across 22 countries in Africa.

Spiritual formation in the contemporary context

A brief introduction to spirituality as a human phenomenon and its nuances in the Australian social context.

Phil Daughtry is a scholar/practitioner in the field of spirituality studies and practical formation. His gift is the curation of conversational and reflective spaces that allow people to find their own spiritual voice and to pay attention to the movements of the sacred in their experience and story. He engages public spiritual conversation from the perspective of the Christian contemplative tradition and a keen sensitivity to the contemporary and Australian context. He is passionate about the facilitation of common spiritual vocabulary and inclusive opportunity.

He serves as Dean of Humanities and Social Sciences, and Dean of Students, with Tabor College. He is an active member of the International Network for the Study of Spirituality and the Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality. Behind that though is the way we share these stories and actions, and how we link it in authentic, no BS way to Christian faith.

We can also learn from the faith we see in those who have lost everything. That's the kind of stuff we'll talk about with you.

Julie and Jonathan have two teenage sons, with 12 years of experience in Lutheran schools between them! Therefore, we know first-hand the wrestle with faith and Christian studies, alongside cars and girls and KFC and all the other challenges teens confront 😊

What's the faith of the next generation worth? The response we want to give to this question is, "everything" but is this the case? In this session we'll engage in a conversation around some key learnings from a church plant in a state school and explore practical steps your organisation can take to ensure that the faith of the next generation is your highest priority.

Chris leads Beyond Church, a church plant in the northern suburbs of Brisbane, which has a vision to 'create churches that unchurched people love to engage with'.

Chris has a passion for sharing the life-changing message of Jesus in a way that connects with unchurched and de-churched people. He is married to his beautiful wife Emma, and is what some people would refer to as a coffee snob.

Sex Education in Lutheran Schools

Given the recent public instances of sexual assault and harassment in government as well as in private schools around Australia, Lutheran education need to wrestle with how and why we teach our students about sex and sexuality. This presentation will review some of the current research around sexual activity of young people and effective forms of sex education as well as the Lutheran theology and history related to sex and education. This presentation will explore three main questions related to sex education:

- 1) Why should we provide Sex Education in Lutheran Schools?
- 2) What is the goal of Sex Education in Lutheran Schools?
- 3) What is needed to effectively teach Sex Education in Lutheran Schools?

This presentation will look at sex education from a Pastoral Care, Christian Studies and a Ministry and Worship perspective. [Please note that this presentation will primarily refer to a middle and senior school context but some of the philosophical underpinnings will be useful to a primary/junior school context as well. Also, this presentation will involve candid conversations around various forms of sexual activity as we review some of the data relevant to the topic at hand.]

Adam has served as a Chaplain and Senior Chaplain in Lutheran Schools for over 10 years. Currently the Senior Chaplain at Unity College, Adam's focus has been on establishing a wholistic approach to

Lutheran Education that attempts to merge ministry and worship, pastoral care and Christian studies in order to provide a student-centric approach to faith-based education. Originally from Alaska, he lives in the Adelaide Hills with his Wife, Elischa and two sons Bryce and Tobias.

Simple Prayer for Complex Times: The Gift of Christian Meditation
