



- Demoralised principals and leaders.
- Centralised bureaucratic control insensitive to local conditions.
- Unrealistic national curriculum initiatives.
- Poor salaries and conditions for teachers.
- ... And also many of the current problems facing Australian schools.









# Promising Possibilities



**Sister School Arrangements** – pen pals, visits of students, staff, principals.

**Offering Scholarships** – boarding or home stay – competitive academic


**Identifying collaborative projects** – helping to improve infrastructure


**Staff exchanges** – short or long term – rotating through a number of staff members

**Guest Lectureships** – in areas of short supply e.g. Maths, Physics, Chemistry, ICT

**Joint Professional Development** – for PNG and Australian staff; leadership training

## Potential Potholes . . .






Communication can be difficult

Phone system is not reliable and email is not universally available.


Crime and violence are much more prevalent than in most areas of Australia.
